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## CORONA\_VIRUS PANDEMIC AND THE EFFECTS OF THE LOCKDOWN AND RESTRICTION OF MOVEMENT ON NIGERIANS.

Coronavirus also known as COVID 19, a global outbreak emanating from China has sent the world into panic and alarm.
