THE CORONA VIRUS PANDEMIC (COVID-19)

The Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) is an infectious disease caused by a newly discovered coronavirus. Most people infected with the COVID-19 virus will experience mild to moderate respiratory illness and recover without requiring special treatment. Older people, and those with underlying medical problems like cardiovascular disease, diabetes, chronic respiratory disease, and cancer are more likely to develop serious illness, if they ever caught the virus.

So far so many countries have taken responsibility of closing their respective borders in order to stop the enablement of foreign aircraft or transportation of goods from other countries. This virus has not only led to the death of many people, both young and old but it has allowed for the need to always ensure personal hygiene amongst one another. The best way to prevent and slow down transmission are; to be well informed about the COVID-19 virus, the disease it causes and how it spreads. Medical advisers have advised that everyone should protect themselves and others from infection by washing of hands or using an alcohol based rub frequently and not touching our face. The COVID-19 virus spreads primarily through droplets of saliva or discharge from the nose when an infected person coughs or sneezes, so it's important that you also practice respiratory etiquette (for example, by coughing into a flexed elbow).

The 2019–20 coronavirus pandemic has also affected educational systems worldwide, leading to the near-total closures of schools, universities and colleges. As of 27 April 2020, approximately 1.725 billion learners are currently affected due to school closures in response to the pandemic.School closures impact not only students, teachers, and families, but have far-reaching economic and societal consequences. School closures in response to COVID-19 have shed light on various social and economic issues, including student debt, digital learning, food insecurity, and homelessness, as well as access to childcare,health care, housing,internet, and disability services. The impact was more severe for disadvantaged children and their families, causing interrupted learning, compromised nutrition, childcare problems, and consequent economic cost to families who could not work.

I. Order to prevent the spread of COVID-19:

Clean your hands often. Use soap and water, or an alcohol-based hand rub. Maintain a safe distance from anyone who is coughing or sneezing. Don't touch your eyes, nose or mouth.

Cover your nose and mouth with your bent elbow or a tissue when you cough or sneeze.

Stay home if you feel unwell.
