1. Attempt an incisive interrogation of Solomon A. Edebor's Good Morning, Sodom, underscoring at least five underlying thematic thrusts the drama engages.

❖ Theme of Love

Love is a powerful feeling of esteem and affection. Erotic, agape, storge, playful, and self-love are all forms of love.

In Good Morning Sodom, a variety of different types of love are shown, including agape, sexual, self-love, and storage.

Dr. and Mrs. Richards showed their daughter Keziah agape and unselfish love by comforting her and being there for her both before and after her unplanned and unexpected pregnancy and delivery. After the trauma and after she left the school to move to another one, Keziah's parents and demolas were present.

Demola and Keziah formerly had a playful love for one another before k.k. and bentol persuaded him to have sex with her against her will and without her consent since they thought she was playing hard to get.

Demola never encouraged or portrayed romantic affection for Keziah.

❖ Theme of Fear

❖ Theme of Peer Pressure

Demola felt he was a victim of peer pressure during his time in college because his parents weren't there. He was persuaded by the wrong friends to live off campus, rape Keziah, and indulge in hard drugs and join a cult, all of which contributed to his premature demise. K.k. and bentol, who replaced his parents in his life, were the ones that encouraged him to do a lot of the things he did.

Theme of Betrayal

Demola had tricked Keziah into going to his house and raped her; this action left Keziah pregnant and forced her to endure harsh treatment from her parents, who felt betrayed by her and thought she was promiscuous.
