- KEZIAH RICHARDS: She is the story's protagonist and primary character. She is a fair young lady in her late teens who is medium in height and little chubby. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richards, only have her. Keziah is a person who values her privacy and only divulges information to others that she wants them to know. - Demola: One of the characters in Solomon A. Edebor's drama Good Morning Sodom is Demola Diran. He is a Mayflower University undergraduate studying English and Literary Studies, just like Keziah. Additionally, he is the only child of Engr. and Mrs. Diran. In his life, his parents didn't truly act as parents. Cultism is an extremely important and essential in this play since it directly contributed to the play's conclusion. The Red Shadows Confraternity is the name of the cult in the drama. When this cult organisation assaulted its rival group, the majority of its members perished, and that is when the play's chaos began.

This can have a long lasting impact on the child's life. This can also greatly affect the child when he or she begins to grow. This is due to the fact that the child did not get the major or correct words of advice or encouragement from his parents while growing up.
